LISTEN VERY CAREFULLY, I SHALL SAY THIS ONLY ONCE: The deadline for the next issue of CMag is Friday, 3rd June. This is also the day I return from my Dixiecon trip. Therefore, there is no point phoning in orders for the next deadline -- the answerphone will not be on. WAITING LISTS AND THINGS: The London & South West Railway Rivals game starts this time, and we even have a couple of people over for the next list. Unless anyone has any violent objections, I would like to try the Yorkshire trial map, if only because it's the only R.R. map in this or any other universe that has Northallerton as a key town... Note also that this game will use the Bus Boss scoring system, where the points awarded for each race in the racing rounds depends on the number of entrants:

Meanwhile, there are also two new International waiting lists. As with all international lists, a couple of domestic players are welcome, but overseas players will have priority. The first is for the next Diplomacy variant game, which will be Woolworth II-D. The rules for this can be found inside, and I'll see if I can get a map sorted for publication next time. In the meantime, anyone who wants to see the map before signing up is welcome to ask for a copy. This game will be run to alternate issues, which should work out at 6-8 weekly.

The new R.R. international list will be players' choice of map, as last time. The way this works is that each player can list up to 5 maps they'd like to play, and one absolute veto. I then jiggle the choices, and go with whatever's the most popular. Note that, for this game, I'd like to try a slightly different form of deadline. The game will be run to deadlines every issue, but if any of the overseas players haven't got orders in by the first deadline, then the game will be held over automatically. If they miss the second deadline as well, then they'll be NMR!ed in the normal way. The reasoning behind this is to avoid the problem that's happened several times in the other R.R. internationals, where I've had all the overseas orders in within three weeks, but the domestic players haven't sent in orders since the deadline is six weekly. This will not apply to either of the existing International R.R. games (unless, of course, all the players concerned want it to).

((PS: First off, some final comments on the R.R. Map J game, "GEORGE CLINTON" that didn't make it into the game-end report.:))

MICHAEL HATHAWAY, Birmingham: I was convinced at one stage that I could win this game -- probably before it started. That I came last is no great shock, but the gap between me and other players is proof that NMR!ing seriously damages your score. I mean, I'm not really that bad. Am I? Usual magnanimous thanks and congratulations to all and sundry.

FRED C. DAVIS Jr., Baltimore: I expect to attend this year's Dipcon XXVII at Chapel Hill, N.C., and will be looking forward to seeing you there. I plan to fly down for 3 nights, having already made my reservation and registration, although I haven't booked my plane flights yet.

In case you haven't heard, Atlanticon, which is normally held in the Baltimore Convention Centre Downtown, is dead. Robert Sacks' New York Games Board will, instead, run a small gathering on the campus of the University of Maryland in College Park in October. (My son, Kevin now goes to school in College Park, which is a suburb of Washington. When the school was founded some 70 years ago, it was out in the country, but now it's surrounded by suburbia, and by 1995, the Washington Metro will arrive there.

However, Sacks & Co. have already made arrangements to run the Diplomacy and other multi-player tournaments at the big Origins Con in Philadelphia in 1995. Origins has decided to stop running around the country, and to settle permanently in Philadelphia. So, Sacks etc. will still be bidding to host the 1995 Dipcon at Origins next year.

I'm guessing that Origins will not be in Central City Philadelphia, but rather in one of the huge suburban shopping malls, such as the one in Cherry Hill, New Jersey, where prior gaming cons have been held. I hope to have more details in time to print them in the next <u>Diplomag</u>.

((PS: At the moment, it looks as if the World Dip Con rotation will end up as 1995 Continental Europe; 1996 North America. Given that I've heard nothing about specific cons wanting to bid for 1996, I'm assuming that David Hood, as the current Dipcon chairman, will put in a pro-forma bid for "1996 Dipcon -- wherever it turns out to be." This means that the WDC Society will effectively be "delegating" the choice of the 1996 WDC to the 1995 Dipcon society.))

((This is a rather neat way of preserving the rights of each group to choose their own sites, whilst making sure that WDC and Dipcon end up in the same place in 1996. Having a WDC and Dipcon at separate locations in North America would simply harm both -- indeed, I am slightly surprised by the extent that WDC in England in 1994 seems to be harming the 1994 Dipcon at Dixiecon, with several prominent no-shows caused by people choosing to go to WDC instead.))

We had a good time in Germany, although it was a bit cooler than we expected. We found Inge's mother to be in better physical shape than we expected. We were very unhappy with the treatment we received from Continental Airlines. Hope you never have to fly it. We flew home from Frankfurt to Newark, and were supposed to transfer to another flight to Baltimore,

leaving Newark at 4.10 p.m. They kept us sitting around until 9.30 p.m., while the plane was "under repair," before they gave up and told us that it was canceled. They had to pay for our hotel room and breakfast, and then put us on a flight at 8.30 a.m. the next morning. The flight took only 36 minutes. Had they told us earlier, we could have taken another flight, or taken Amtrak to Baltimore.

((PS: This is very bad business from Continental's point of view-- not only do they have two very disgruntled customers (or, I gather, now former customers), but they have to pay out for hotel rooms as well. Multiply this by the number of people on the flight, and you begin to understand why so many U.S. Airlines are in Chapter 11 bankruptcy.))

IAIN BOWEN, York: As you've sort of indirectly dragged up the 'Georgia Gas Station Incident', I feel that it is my bounded duty to regale the readership of <u>CMag</u> with this little drollity.

It was after World Beach Con in 1990, Sullivan had fled back to the UK whilst yours truly, Steve Nicewarner and John Ellman were heading to Atlanta for Origins and to meet back up with the rest of the UK Lushes JetSet Crew. My apologies to my Southern friends for any inaccurate rendition of their accents, but it is difficult to represent them without using IPA phonetics. Also no slur is intended, if I were to live in another English speaking country - then the former Confederacy would be my first choice.

It isn't the world's shortest drive from St Simon's Island to Atlanta and even Nicewarner's Rice Rocket needs refuelling, never mind rest-stops and food-stops. Anyway, as I was generously being conveyed for free across Georgia (saving the cost of a Greyhound ticket), I offered to pay for the gas. ((PS: Presumably this is all somehow related to the assertion that the best chat-up line to use in the United States is "Hi! I'm from England and I have a Cute Accent!"))

DENIS JONES, Tooting: Noticed the 10 p.m. GMT comment, those of us who reckon you should use BST when telling British readers what to do will break the legs of smartarses.

I thought the visits to overseas conventions was a war of posing by a couple of Englishmen. Anyway, it shows off the long holidays we get to foreigners with less rights than us. And with the way exchange rates are going it might be very expensive to visit other countries soon.

((PS : Greenwich Mean Time it is ; British Summer Time is not an official international standard, so I'd have to refer to it as GMT +0100.))

JOHN DODDS, London: I think you are unfair to Stephen Agar (but I can see your point). Stephen has a very hands on approach to life. In some ways that is admirable: there are far too many people in this hobby who prefer to pontificate about things rather than getting off their backsides and doing them. Result: suckers like you and me end up doing half the necessary jobs. Insofar as Stephen is a doer as well as a commentator, that is very welcome, and he has made a huge contribution to revitalising the hobby in the last two years.

Where I worry is that he seems to want to take on something new every month. I don't think this is an advanced form of megalomania. I think he just sees things which are not being done as well as they might be (or in a way that he doesn't agree with) and wants to "improve" the world.

The risk of course, is that sooner or later he will take on one thing too many and go supernova, and the rest of us will be left to try to pick up the pieces. I have suggested to Stephen on several occasions that he might be taking on too much. The hobby needs his valuable input over a sustained period rather than for a brief instant.

You picked up two of Stephen's latest wheezes: the Zine Poll and the Hobby Archives.

On the Zine Poll, I think Stephen is, frankly, living in the past. This is a multi-games hobby and has been for fifteen years. A zine like <u>Cut and Thrust</u> would be part of the hobby and should be included in the zine poll even if it didn't run a game of Diplomacy (just as <u>Take That You Fiend</u> is eligible).

Where I think Stephen has a point is that there is a world of difference between zines which run board games (of all kinds) and zines which are exclusively devoted to Soccerboss or United! (The same could be said about zines which are entirely focused on En Garde!) Although there is some overlap, I think a good case can be made for saying that as far as the Zine Poll is concerned we should stick to a definition based around board games.

((PS: But that is no more than Ryk Downes was suggesting in his original comments. Given that Stephen was passed over for the Zeen Poll custodianship, it's easy (and possibly wrong, but who knows?) to deduce that he was looking for the slightest sign of deviation from Ryk so that he could try to get the custodianship issue re-opened. Especially since he wrote initially to Iain, rather than Ryk.))

((Also, as you say, Stephen's criticisms ignore the changes that have taken place during the 1980s, and the move to a multi-games hobby. Not unreasonably, Stephen's knowledge of the hobby during the 1980s is fairly limited, as he wasn't active then. Contrariwise, the same applies to my knowledge of the 1970s. But rather than recognise that there is a gap in his hobby experience that he could fill by discussing things in private, he rushes into print, like an Internet newbie who can't be bothered to wait for the FAQ to be posted.))

Turning now to the Archives. I was a bit concerned that what Stephen wrote in the latest Spring Offensive might be interpreted as a MidCon/ManorCon war. I should say that I think that the way the Hobby Archives have become marginalised in recent years is a disgrace, and if Stephen wants to set up an alternative reference source, then fine. But I don't agree with Stephen's analysis that the present state of the Archives is in some sense the fault of ManorCon, or that it is really the role of MidCon to put this right. (In calling his new collection the MidCon Archives, I think Stephen is just trying to establish that they are common property and not his private possessions).

((PS: A Manorcon/Midcon feud is far more likely to be sparked off by Stephen's comments that "the Manorcon Committee just seem to indulge him because he's been on their committee for years". The idea that there is some kind of omerta is wonderfully silly. It is also rather difficult to square with the fact that Stephen was warned by both me and Iain Bowen in private conversation not to trade with Froggy, as it would be trading with a black hole.))

((Stephen looks around, and sees that several hobby services are being run by members of the Manorcon and Midcon committees. He therefore deduces a causal link between the two, However, the link (such as it is -- there are plenty of other hobby services out there) is simply that people who are active hobbyists are more likely to run hobby services, and are also more likely to be on convention committees. It's like saying that people taking their shirts off causes higher ice-cream sales. Well no, it's a third factor (sunny weather) that causes both the others.))

Personally, I would much prefer to have one comprehensive Hobby Archive rather than two. But if the "official" archive remains inaccessible (and I believe it is no longer being added to on a regular basis) then am not surprised that someone like Stephen with a genuine interest in hobby history tries to set up an alternative reference source. As you might expect, had I the time or the interest, I would have approached the problem in a different way, trying to build a consensus that Andy Bate was no longer the best person to look after the official archives, rather than going off and setting up my own in competition. But that just highlights the difference in approach between Stephen and I.

((PS: I actually have no problems with having a second "Hobby Archive" -- like the UK Variant Bank, there is a benefit in having a back-up in case anything ever happens to the original (see various discussions on this topic in Costaguana in 1986). However, Stephen then goes on to criticise Andy Bate for not producing catalogues, reprints of archive material and so on. Once again, if he was clued up on hobby history from 1981-1990, he would know that RJW never did much of this either when he was looking after the Archives, certainly not after he took over as Manorcon head honcho. However, the Archives were always there if anyone wanted to refer to them (as some did - I built up the original base of Miller Numbers from it in 1985). The main task of the Archivist is to keep the new zeens flowing in and maintain the collection. I have no idea (although I might suspect) how well Andy has been doing this, as I haven't spoken to him on the matter. Has Stephen?))

STEPHEN AGAR, Brighton: Dear John and Pete:

This letter is to both of you because John has copied his recent letter to Pete on the subject of Pete's attack on me in <u>C'est Magnifique</u> 139.

Actually I'm not trying to compete with Andy at all. I do find him frustrating because he is all promises and no action - and this goes for the Miller Nos. and the Archives. The way he has treated Froggy subscribers is a disgrace which would have had him more or less drummed out of the hobby if he'd been anyone else.

((PS: This is true, but only in the sense that Andy is *known* to be unreliable, and has been ever since the second issue of Froggy took 6 months to arrive. Hence, people discount their expectations. To imply that Andy is protected by some kind of wicked and dastardly Manorcon cabal is facile, and virtually actionable. In effect, you are implying that I am party to a conspiracy to commit fraud.))

((Note that during the time I was OGRe, only one player in Froggy ever asked me what was going on, and given the person involved, I suspect it was merely a case of an editor on the trawl for some orphans. Sounds like discounted expectations to me. As it was, I made several attempts to try and rescue the Froggy games, but it proved impossible. Andy was never quite totally out of the hobby, and I got the distinct impression that he would resist any attempt to take over his games unilaterally. This could lead to a situation where half the players would send orders to me, half to Andy, and all drop out of one or other games. So in the end I had to back off. I'm not so sure in retrospect that this was the right decision.))

But no, I'm not trying to compete, because it is a good idea to have a back-up collection in any event, and if we don't take further steps to put such a back-up collection together now, then it will be too late. I've had offers of help from Pete Birks, Richard Sharp, Andy Davidson, Mark Nelson, Toby Harris, Haz Bond, Ryk Downes and many others, so there is a reasonable chance of getting something together. My chief aim is to reprint old, but interesting, articles, hopefully in a couple publications a year (one for MidCon, the other for ManorCon). I will certainly have some sort of publication available for ManorCon (at which I will be in search of more promises to help).

By the way Pete, what are the "merits of Andy's custodianship" with regard to either Miller Numbers or the Zine Archive?

((PS: This was intended to be ironic, or, if you prefer, post-ironic. You're not American, are you, Stephen?))

No doubt you are talking about the up to date Miller Numbers he allocates (?), the way he has published regular (any?) Miller Number publications (?)

((PS : A few, but you are basically right.))

and his up-to-date publication of a Zine Archive catalogue (?). You know full well that Andy has done nothing but make promises for years and the hobby has just sat back and patted him on the back.

((PS : No, they have just ignored him and gone on to better things.))

For better or worse, hobby history really interests me, and I want to publish a relational catalogue database open to all (written in MS Access) which will include listings of relevant articles and which is backed up with a zine archive article service. I am dropping all of my Labour Party commitments after the elections in two weeks time, which will free up more spare time. If either you (John) or Pete want to help, I will attach a file to this message with the contents of the zines I got from Nick Kinzett. Can either of you help me fill any gaps?

Pete's comments on my attitude to the Zine Poll were just silly. His basic criticism of me was that when Ryk Downes said in Shadowplay (and this is verbatim) "the rule whereby a zine must run a game (or variant) of Diplomacy is likely to be relaxed..." I then "either wilfully or accidentally misinterpreted this to mean that Ryk intends to relax the entry criteria to allow in zeens that don't run Diplomacy." Now am I missing something here, or is my "wilful misinterpretation" in reality EXACTLY WHAT RYK SAID!

((PS: The point is that this is not a "relaxation" of the criteria, since non-Dip zeens are already part of the Poll. The Poll criteria since John Piggott took over have been fairly tight, certainly compared to when Richard Walkerdine ran the poll --was it 150 zeens that qualified in 1985, Richard?))

It is a red herring to say that there are non-Diplomacy zines in the Zine Poll already, as I accept that zines which are substantially connected to the postal Diplomacy hobby should be included (e.g. Take That You Fiend, Greatest Hits etc.). However, I would rather not see zines which neither run Diplomacy nor are substantially connected to the postal

Diplomacy hobby be included in the Zine Poll, as I prefer to see the Diplomacy section of the postal games world have its own awards system. No, if anyone is indulging in "wilful misinterpretation" it is Pete, as he tries to voice (in a garbled way) second hand news passed on by Iain Bowen. For Pete's information, I have squared things with Ryk and offered to help him in checking ballots and eligibility for next year's Poll.

As for my offer to run the Zine Poll being megalomania, if Pete had probed Iain further, Iain would no doubt have confirmed that (a) my offer was on the basis that if I ran the Poll I would disqualify Spring Offensive as it was my zine (hardly self-aggrandisement), (b) my offer (like Richard Walkerdine's) was on the basis that I'd do it if he couldn't find someone better and (c) when Iain told me who the other candidates were I suggested Ryk Downes would be the best choice! No, I just can't win, can I?

((PS: This is irrelevant, since, if you *were* a megalomaniac, the ego boost from running the Poll every year would more than outweigh the occasional boost from winning it. Unless, of course, you intend to win the Poll every year...))

I don't suppose that Pete may consider he owes me just the tiniest glimmer of an apology? No, I thought not.

((PS: I accept that I was being a bit naughty in attributing motives based on actions, but the gap between Ryk taking over and your clarion call to the hobby invites misinterpretation. I am perfectly willing to trade apologies, if you wish to clarify your remarks about "If it wasn't for his position on the Manorcon committee, I don't think he would have ... got away with it for so long."))

((To which Stephen replied:))

STEPHEN AGAR, Brighton: 1. Saying that you just discount your expectations doesn't exactly ensure that Miller Numbers and the Archive are run efficiently, does it? You end up writing them off, in much the same way the hobby has written off the Froggy games. I know some people who subbed to Froggy when it reappeared who didn't have the benefit of your insight into Andy's personality who now feel aggrieved.

((PS: I am not responsible for ensuring that the Miller Numbers and Archives are run efficiently. Nor, I might add, are you. Hobby services are usually considered to be the responsibility of their custodians, for good or ill. And people were "warned off" the revived Froggy in just about every zeen I saw at the time. They can't say they weren't warned!))

Doing a Froggy is even becoming a term of abuse in the US now! Of course none of this is usually a problem because when someone does nothing and more or less drops out, they tend to abandon interest in the hobby and thus allow others to fill the gap. However Andy keeps a hobby profile through the ManorCon Committee and I don't think he would relinquish anything without an unseemly fight, so nothing is done.

2. I WAS NOT saying that the ManorCon Committee protects Andy, merely the fact that he is connected to the hobby's most prestigious event gives him respectability which makes any concerted effort to do something about the problem less likely. After all, it is difficult to accuse someone who is on the Committee running the biggest con in the country of not pulling his weight.

((PS: This is not necessarily true, but I take your point, and I welcome your clarification.))

3. Re: Zine Poll. No, I think you are missing the point here. The criteria that has been operated for the past few years for Zine Poll qualification is an "either... or" formula. Either you run a game of Diplomacy or you are connected to the Diplomacy hobby. The second limb has been used to justify the inclusion of GH and TTYF in recent years and I am all for zines which don't run Diplomacy being included if they satisfy this criteria of being intimately connected to the postal Diplomacy hobby. My point is that the zines Ryk wants to introduce could not qualify under this second criteria, hence the need to relax the current criteria in order to include zines which have nothing to do with the postal Diplomacy hobby and which don't run Diplomacy. If this rule about running a Diplomacy game has already been relaxed, why did lain print it on all the ballot papers he issued as Zine Poll custodian?


((PS: I like the phrase "intimately connected" -- it's the first time I've heard it! The idea that you have to be intimate sleep with the Zeen Poll Custodian in order to qualify is a nice extension of the Hollywood "casting couch" principle!))

((The point is that what constitutes "connected" is a matter of opinion. To take a couple of examples Ryk quoted, Scorpio has run Diplomacy in the past (I'm sure everyone still around from 1986 remembers Mark Boyle!) and may well still do so. Whilst Rhubarb Rhubarb runs "hobby" games such as Railway Rivals, which once again links it to the hobby.))

((The problem is that there is no such thing as "the" Hobby - there is Peter Sullivan's hobby, Stephen Agar's hobby, Ryk Downes' hobby and several hundred others. The Poll causes controversy because it requires us to come up with a definition of "the" Hobby for the purposes of the Poll, This far more so than the old arguments about voting systems, which seem to have died away. Especially since people seem to assume that we are coming up with a definition of "the" Hobby which applies to everything -- including what they are and are not allowed to consider part of "their" hobby.))

((This variant designed by Glen Overby & Fred C. Davis Jr., 1981. Rules re-written and map drawn by Andrew Poole.))

- 1. All the usual rules of Diplomacy (1971 rulebook) apply, except where amended below.
- 2. Woolworth Diplomacy is a five-player variant. There are ten Great Powers in the game, each player controls two of these: a 'public' power which is known to all players, and a 'secret' power known only to the controlling player and the g.m.
- 3. Three Great Powers (Balkans, Scandinavia and Spain) are added to the regular seven. The initial set up for all the powers is as follows:

AUSTRIA	F(Trieste),	A(Budapest),	A(Vienna).
BALKANS	A(Bulgaria),	A(Serbia),	F(Greece).
ENGLAND	F(London),	F(Edinburgh),	A or F (Lpl).
FRANCE	F(Brest),	A(Paris),	A or F (Mar).
GERMANY	F(Kiel),	A(Munich),	A(Berlin).
ITALY	F(Naples),	A(Venice),	A or F (Rome).
RUSSIA	A(Moscow),	A(Warsaw),	F(Sevastapol), A or F (StP).
SCAND.	F(Norway),	A(Sweden),	F(Denmark).
SPAIN	A(Portugal),	F(Morocco),	A or F (Mad).
TURKEY	F(Ankara),	A(Con),	A or F (Smy).

- 4. All 'choice' set-ups need not be announced until the Spring '01 orders are revealed. Either an army or a fleet may start in these spaces; if the space has two coasts, the fleet may start on either.
- 5. Woolworth uses a version of the regular board with significant modifications.
- 6. The Powers are assigned to players using the following procedure:
- a. Each player submits a list of the ten Great Powers in order of their preferences. Ties are not permitted.
- b. Control of the 'public' powers is decided first. Players' first choices are compared: unique first choices are granted, lots are drawn between players where their first choices are identical.
- c. Once a player is assigned a power, it is removed from all the players' preference lists.
- d. For players who failed to gain their first choices, the process as outlined in b. above is repeated, using the highest choices still available, continuing until all the players have a public power.
- e. When there are only five powers remaining, the process is repeated so as to assign the 'secret' powers.
- 7. The control of secret powers is never revealed by the g.m, though NMR's may make the relationships apparent. Players may do as they like in this regard, telling or not telling as they please.
- 8. As the game is not historically based, it begins in Spring '01 rather than the year 1901.
- 9. There are 39 supply centres on the board. The victory condition is 24 centres, which may be reached by a combination of the strength of the public and secret powers belonging to a player. Adjustments are always separately counted for each power, however.
- 10. There is a 'Direct Passage' link between Sicily and Naples. This allows units to move directly from one of these provinces to the other without in any way affecting flect movement between TYS and ION.

Notes by Andrew Poole: Woolworth Diplomacy gains its title from the shops of the same name, which originally sold all their goods at prices of 5c and 10c and were commonly called 'fives and tens'. The idea of Woolworth is for each player to be able to control both one 'public' and one 'secret' power. To allow this, the number of Great Powers was increased to ten. The three extra powers were created from groups of neutral supply centres in Scandinavia, the Balkans and Iberia.

However, with the ten Great Powers, from the start of the game there is conflict. The Secret powers make it easier to start wars, whilst each player starting the game with six units make it also more necessary. The Secret powers must do all of their diplomacy through press releases, producing some interesting press. The Secret powers need careful play so as to avoid the identity of their owner being revealed, too much co-ordination between a public and a secret power may give the game away (literally!). There are sudden shifts of alliances as players try to find out who their opponents are. There have been mock wars, and a player may have his public power deliberately eliminated so as to continue the war with just the secret power!

THE ABBYSSINIAN PRINCE #144¹ is the latest issue of the only zeen to be distributed both postally and by electronic mail. There's therefore quite a bit of crossover discussion. This time, why the term "Gunboat" doesn't mean the same in the e-mail hobby as it does in postal play. Because of the way e-mail works, it's quite easy to set up a game where players can communicate privately with each other without knowing who they are, via the adjudicating computer. Thus, e-mail players talk about "No-press Gunboat," "Broadcast-press Gunboat" (what postal players would call "Press Gunboat," or just "Gunboat") and "Private-press Gunboat" (effectively a normal game, except you don't know the names of the other players, even though you can communicate with them). Lots of scope for confusion there!

BACKSTABBERS' UNITED MONTHLY #59² is a sample issue that came my way of this massive En Garde! zeen. As well as the En Garde! game, which takes up the first 20 pages of the zeen, there are also games of Railway Rivals, Gunboat Stab, Regular Diplomacy, Bourse, Columbus, Gunboat, Das Boot, Dangerous Liaisons, Lift Off, Speed Circuit, Top Gun, Kingmaker, Gridiron Morons, Machiavelli, Grand National and a Trivia Quiz being played, many of them run by outside g,m.s. Editorial content mainly comes from Frank Blades' contribution, which this time is a commentary on the Zeen Poll results. A deeply impressive production -- sort of the En Garde hobby's answer to Smodnoc.

COSTAGUANA #239 is a lettercol-dominated issue, although Conrad mutters on a bit about old Klingons, and I contribute a piece about the contribution of Mr. Ringo Starr to western musical culture (said piece is a page and a half, which sounds about right). Conrad seems to have decided to go ahead with his plan to carry all the games on flyers outside the main zeen, which given the expense of his copy-shop is probably a wise move. However, we still wish he'd use a page to give summaries of the current positions and waiting and standby lists, in a similar way that Fred C. Davis does in Diplomag for the Mensa games, and Richard Sharp used to do for the Dolchstoß supplement games.

DOLCHSTOB #185³ sees Richard Sharp's account of his latest trip to France, and also the traditional Easter meet at Amersham, where a whole gaggle of Richard's friends turn up to play bridge, snooker, and eat and drink. Meanwhile, Game D55 continues on into Spring 1944, although this time the game-end proposal was defeated by abstentions only, and so is re-proposed. What, they can't be fed up with it already?

MAKING LOVE IN A CANOE #11⁴ is a new trade (hi, Brent!), and yet another zeen with a Monty Python-influenced title. This issue contains a tribute to actor/comedian John Candy who died recently, a lettercol chokka with politics and other topics, and an article on the Winter Olympics. The games load is currently fairly light, as you'd expect from a newish zeen, although Brent does already have a game-end statement for one game, which was orphaned from another Canadian zeen, Countermeasures.

PERELANDRA #118⁵ features a front page tribute to editor Pete Gaughan's wife's 30th Birthday. We obviously have a brave man here. There's an article from Canadian sub-zeen editor Bruce McIntyre on the possible expansion of the American basketball NBA into Canada, and the lettercol features lots of baseball talk. Meanwhile, Pete gives us a full account (with photos!) of his bird-watching trip to the Klamath Basin National Wildlife Refuge.

SPRING OFFENSIVE #22° features lots of hobby chat on various topics, including how Stephen Agar and Iain Bowen stitched up the new editor of A Little Original Sin, James Hardy, in the Diplomacy tournament at Mastercon There's also the latest news on Stephen's zeen archive, together with some reprints from the same. Stephen talks about playing Diplomacy on Compu\$erve, and there are also rules for yet another Middle-Earth Diplomacy variant, Graham Staplehurst's War of the Ring. This one is so complicated that even the Personality Unit Table takes up a whole page! Meanwhile, Chris Q. Hardy whines about prejudice against cack-handers and suggests a few new "politically-correct" alternatives (e.g. sad socialists, not loony left; rude, not gauche).

And there are probably a couple of other zeens I've received over the past few weeks I've forgotten to mention above. It's been that kind of month...
